Motor Cycle Course - PPE

The following information is for all participants undertaking a Motor Cycle Course with AJL Training as instructed by the Dept. of State Growth (Tas Regulatory Authority).

11.1 Helmets

All participants must wear an approved helmet that meets the Australian Standard AS1698 and EU standards in accordance with the Tasmanian Road Rules 20091 (must display a sticker to indicate this) during the Course. Participants helmets must be inspected for compliance with section 11.1.

11.2 High Visibility Vest

A hi-visibility vest must be worn by assessors and all course participants during all activities in the Pre-Learner Motorcycle Course, Check Ride and Pre-Provisional Motorcycle Test and any One on One course.

11.3 Personal Protective Clothing

All participants must wear appropriate protective clothing (including gloves for riding), sturdy footwear and an approved helmet that as per section 11.1 during the Pre-Learner Motorcycle Course, Check Ride and Pre-Provisional Motorcycle Test and also a One on One course they may undertake initially.

The participant must have full skin cover (this is not provided as part of the Courses) for on-range and on-road training activities and assessments. The following are minimal requirements all participants own equipment must be inspected at the commencement:

- Jackets and Pants are highly abrasion and tear resistance. They should be secured at the wrists, waist and ankles to prevent to protective clothing from riding up and exposing skin during a fall; and must cover all skin.
- Footwear: It is recommended that boots be leather and overlap the pants in order to provide shin, ankle and instep protection. They should also have a zipper and /or velcro fasteners in preference to laces to prevent the boots from sliding off. As a minimum boots must cover your ankle.

Participants should seek guidance from the Good Gear Guide on protective clothing, refer https://infrastructure.gov.au/roads/safety/publications/2009/pdf/good gear guide nrsc.pdf

All participants' own equipment must be inspected at the commencement.

Note: Australian Standard is defined in the dictionary.

¹ Rule 270: Approved motor bike helmet

For rule 270, a motor bike helmet is approved for the Road Rules if it complies with at least one of the following standards, has an identifying mark certifying compliance with that standard and has no visible defect:

⁽a) Australian Standard AS/NZS 1698;

⁽b) United Nations Economic Commission for Europe Regulation No. 22 Uniform Provisions Concerning the Approval of Protective Helmets and their Visors for Drivers and Passengers of Motor Cycles and Mopeds Revision 4 of 24 September 2002 (UNECE22.05) and any further amendments to UNECE22.05 approved and published by that Commission, or any later version of UNECE22.05.
